Dear Globe Park Families,

As I reflect on the first month of school, I believe we are off to a great start. Open House was a huge success and our Bingo night was well attended. Full day kindergarten is falling into a positive routine and the transition into academic school life is thriving in classrooms where learning IS our focus!

The principal cafés are in effect, with our first one having a total of 15 parents in attendance. At any time, please reach out to your child’s teacher to foster open communication that may include questions regarding your child’s academic progress, classroom expectations or any other topics you may face during the school year. Please know that we are eager to hear about the things your family are celebrating just as much as ways to improve our work with your children.

JUST A REMINDER, Globe Park School is an entirely peanut/nut/egg free building. We have many students with these allergies and one way we can better ensure their safety is to not bring these items to school. Please be conscious of the snacks and lunches that you pack for your child daily. If a nut product enters the building, it will be sent home and a lunch will be provided to the child at a cost to you. A great substitute for peanut butter is Sunny Butter a product made from Sunflower seeds. Thank you in advance for your understanding and cooperation.

We're off to a great start! We've settled in and are becoming familiar with daily routines. The children are happy to be here and are adjusting well. We are working at assessing all of the children in order to target their specific academic needs. The months of October through December will be very busy as we work to meet designated goals in all academic areas.

In the area of Literacy, the children will be learning letters, their sounds and their placement in words. Syllables, segmenting and blending sounds will also be covered. Rhyming is an important skill we will target. Any review of these skills that you can cover with your child at home will help. Sight words (red words) are also being introduced and reviewed daily. Please go over these at home regularly. Once the pre-primer list has been mastered, I will gladly send you the next one. The children will also be learning how to write words this year, so you can see that practicing how to write a letter is of the utmost importance and will be focused on during the next few months.

Being read to is a very important part of Literacy development. Understanding who the characters are, the story's sequence and predicting are all concepts the children must learn. Retelling is also covered. Again, these are all skills you are able to review with your child at home when reading together. Please refer to the sheet of comprehension questions I gave you at orientation. The children must be able to answer questions about stories they read and hear.

You have all received an outline of what we are covering in Math for September and October. You will be getting another outline in November for November and December. Please make Math part of your daily conversation, to help keep concepts fresh in their minds.

Report cards should be going home Dec. 1st and our first parent conference is scheduled for December 2nd. A notice about conferences will be going home in your child's folder sometime in November. Please be sure to check your child's green folder daily for assignments and important information about upcoming events. I also ask that you clean out the "Keep at Home" side daily.

I'd like to thank you for your support and cooperation as we begin this year together. For those of you who have sent in boxes of tissue and disinfecting wipes I am grateful. These are items are used daily in our class.

Your help at home this year is vital in helping your child reach the targets expected by June. Working together will help to ensure success for your child. Please don't hesitate to write me notes or comments on the homework as we go forward. The folders are checked daily and communications via this folder are pretty reliable.

Room 1 has been very busy learning the routines, structure and classroom/school rules. They have made great progress in this task. They have started their Foundations and Reading Workshop work all in preparation to learn letters, letter sounds and how to engage in reading readiness opportunities. In math they have been rote counting, learning how to form the numbers and working on identifying shapes.

In the upcoming months we will begin learning sight words, retelling stories and understanding the roles of the author and illustrator. Higher rote counting, improving their one to one correspondence and learning more challenging shapes will occur during math time.

As the time continues into the Fall we will have social study lessons on various topics such as learning about our city and state, our holidays such as Thanksgiving/Pilgrims and roles of community helpers. In time, more detailed science lessons around weather, the human body and animals will become part of our daily routine. Thanks to all the parents who are remembering to check and send in their child's folder each day! PS-please don't forget your child's snack.


Writing- Narratives and Writing Steps in a Procedure

We send the facts for each week home on Fridays so that you will have adequate time to make the corresponding flash cards. Those sheets are for your information only and do not need to be returned to school. The science units we will be studying this trimester are Weather, Plants, and Animals. In social studies, of course, we have many upcoming holidays and celebrations to learn about as well as learning all about the election process. We look forward to a busy and productive year with our new second graders!

Happy Autumn! The leaves are changing to beautiful orange, yellow and red colors and the school year is underway! The third graders are adjusting to a new year of learning new reading, new math skills and new responsibilities. Students are finishing up their first September Monthly Book Report – on Realistic Fiction/Short Story Book. The October Monthly Book Report will be on a Mystery Book on the student's reading level. Globe Park Common Core Reading Standard is for each child to read and EXCEED reading "25 Books" this year!! Be sure to fill out the Globe Park School Reading Log! Bring it to your teacher when it is completely filled out. We will gladly give you another one. Please monitor your child's nightly reading (for 15 minutes or more) as well. It would be very helpful if your child would read aloud to an adult or an older child to help them to correct their reading errors and to improve their Reading Fluency and Comprehension. We have just finished the Math Unit on place value, rounding, and estimating numbers. Next, we will focus on adding and subtracting whole numbers and adding and subtracting decimals using money. Science topics include Force and Motion and Sound Energy. We encourage your child to have a "Home-Homework Schedule" each evening. He/She should have a set quiet time to focus on doing and completing their work. They will need tools (sharpened pencils, erasers, homework from school, etc.) ready to do their work so they will not get distracted. Please check their written assignments in their homework folders and any school notices that need to be read, signed and returned. Mrs. Parker - TIME

Welcome Globe Park Family and Friends! I am Chris Parker a TIME Teacher (which means... Teacher In Multiple Environments). This year I will be assisting students with math support as well as chairing Globe's RTI team. Response To Intervention is a process that schools have in place to help students who are struggling in the general education classrooms. A teacher or parent brings a student and what their academic and/or behavioral struggles are and they brainstorm on ideas and solutions to help that student succeed and overcome barriers that are prohibiting them to reach their academic potential. This process runs on a Tier system, which means as follows: Tier 1- is the classroom, where your child's teacher is trying to help your child with extra help above and beyond what the entire class is receiving. A teacher may need more ideas and therefore comes to the RTI team and talks with other professionals for ideas and tools to help your child. If this extra help in the classroom is still not helping your child achieve to where he/she needs to be they may go to Tier 2- this is where an interventionist such as a reading teacher, or a TIME teacher may help your child with extra math and/or reading help. These interventionists will utilize different tools than what the classroom teacher used and will do strategic teaching to help your child read and/or understand math concepts at their grade level. On rare occasions if your child still is struggling and NOT making progress then your child may move to Tier 3- this may involve several different support personnel. Some of the personnel that may help at this level may be a Speech and Language Pathologist, an Occupational Therapist, a Physical Therapist, the school Psychologist, and possibly a Resource Teacher. At each Tier- students are followed and monitored with specific data to ensure they are making progress and closing the "gap". Here are some ways you can help your child succeed at school:

1. **Meet your child's teacher... come to open house (details will be coming)**
Let him/her know you want to help your child learn. Make it clear that if the teacher sees a problem developing, you want to hear about it immediately.
2. **Attend parent-teacher conferences**
3. **When Unsure... Ask questions**
4. **Join your child's parent-teacher group**
At Globe we have the PTA, who meets monthly to talk about school. The meetings give you a good chance to talk with other parents and work together to improve the school.
5. **Help out at your child's school**
There are many ways you can contribute. You can volunteer in your child's class or in the school library.
6. **Make sure your child does home work**
Ask your child each day what he or she did to day at school. Make sure your child studies and finishes assignments. Read your child's report cards.
7. **Find homework help for your child**
If it's difficult for you to help your child with other homework or school projects, see if you can find someone else who can help; such as older student, neighbor, or friend can help. We can also offer some websites that are available for homework help.
8. **Learn what the school offers**
Read information the school sends home; especially **the tri-monthly Newsletter!** Talk to other parents to find out what programs the school offers.

Parents you are your child's first teacher and together with grade school teachers you will make a difference in your child's life!

SCHOOL NURSE HEALTH SERVICES

The School Nurse is concerned with the health and physical well being of all students. The School Nurse provides care to students who become ill at school, but the primary responsibility for student health and medical care remains with the parents. Therefore, students who are ill at home should remain at home and seek private medical care.

HEALTH CONCERNS: Please fill both sides of the entrance form you receive at registration. Any emergency contact person must be able to provide transportation for your child if needed. **It is critical that parents immediately notify the school when there is a change in phone numbers!** It is just as important to notify the School Nurse when there has been a change in your child's medical condition, newly diagnosed allergies, surgeries or medication taken at home.

Parents must inform the bus driver and monitor of any medical condition your child has, so adequate preparations may be made as necessary.

ILLNESS/ABSENCE: Contact the school office in the morning if your child is going to be absent from school and indicate the reason:

- Students who have had a fever of 100 degrees or higher, vomiting or diarrhea must be kept out of school for 24 hours after the last episode occurred and must be fever-free for at least 24 hours before returning to school.
- Students diagnosed with conjunctivitis (pink-eye), strep throat or impetigo cannot return to school for 24 hours from the time the first dose of the *prescription* medication has been given or applied. If your child is injured, has a fever or is contagious during the school day, it is our policy to notify the parent and exclude the student for his benefit and the safety of others.
- Chicken Pox – exclusion from school until all lesions are crusted over.
- Fifth Disease – there is no need to exclude since once the diagnosis has been made and the rash has appeared, the disease is no longer contagious. However, please notify the school of this diagnosis so that we may contact employees or other students as necessary.
- Head Lice – if live lice are found, your child will be excluded from school until treated. A parent must accompany their child back to school after treatment to be checked by the nurse before returning to the classroom.
- Injuries – documentation such as a doctor's note is needed for exclusion or limitations from gym, recess or other activities. Such notes must be submitted to the **School Nurse**.

MEDICATION: If at all possible, medications should be taken at home before or after school hours. If it is absolutely necessary that medication be administered during school hours, the following procedures must be followed:

- Present written order from their private physician.
- Present written parent permission to take this medication at school.
- An adult must bring in the medication in the original prescription bottle properly labeled by a pharmacist as required by law.
- Only the Certified School Nurse-Teacher may administer medication, unless there is written permission from the student's physician and parent that the student may carry and / or self-administer inhalers and epi-pens.
- All unused medications must be picked up in the nurse's office by an adult at the end of the school year, or it will be destroyed/disposed of before the summer break.
- Over-the-counter medications (Tylenol / Ibuprofen) may be given with special parent permission (Consent form).

SCREENINGS: Screenings for vision, dental, scoliosis and hearing are mandated by the RI Department of Health each year, depending on student's grade.

- All students registering for the first time or re-enrolling in school, must present proof of immunizations and a current physical examination, including a vision exam, as required by RI State Law.

Welcome back! Students in the months of September & October will be participating in Physical Fitness Games and Activities. All students will be going outside for PE. Students in PE/Health will also be going outside with the exception of first grade. Students should wear layers of clothing/jackets based on the weather. Sneakers are also needed to reduce the risk of injury. The first health unit for grades k-2 will be safety and grades 3-5 will be bullying. All students will work on cooperative games when outdoors. Please feel free to call if you have any questions or concerns about your child.

Hello Parents,

The best gift that you can give to your child is the gift of reading. Reading at home is essential for students to increase their listening attention span, develop knowledge of vocabulary and book language, figure out tricky words, gain practice so they read smoothly, and increase their reading level. Those who read at home become better readers than those who don't, and many who do not read at home, fall behind in school. Here are some ways that you can help your child develop into a good reader:

- Provide a quiet place for them to read without distractions.
- Insist that they spend at least 15 minutes each night either listening to a story or reading themselves.
- Help them choose stories that are of interest to them.
- Help them choose books that are not too difficult to read.
- Talk to them about the story and pictures.
- Ask them what they think about what's happening in the story or what they think will happen next.
- Give them wait time to figure out a tricky word.
- Praise them for all of their efforts and avoid criticism.
- Enjoy and have fun! Make this a pleasant time for your child and make great memories with them.

The time spent is well worth it!! Your child will reap all of the benefits.
